## Real-world skills



### Jobs in high demand



# Life in and around the Waikato



Waikato is the fourth-largest region in Aotearoa New Zealand, stretching 25,000 square kilometres from the Bombay Hills in the north, Raglan to the west, the Kaimai Range in the east, and Lake Taupō to the south. Waikato has a rich history and a diverse population of around 500,000 people.

One of the best things about living in Waikato is the proximity to a diverse range of activities. Explore nearby beaches, mountains, rivers, and the green countryside. Visit Hamilton Gardens, the Waikato Museum, or weekly farmers and craft markets. World-class sporting venues and facilities are nearby, including Lake Karapiro, the Waikato River Trail, the Avantidrome, Seddon Park, and FMG Stadium Waikato. The Waikato region is home to the Waitomo Caves, Hobbiton, and Sanctuary Mountain Maungatautari. Wintec is in the middle of it all.



# Our commitment to pastoral care

The Code mandates one set of clear rules and expectations for embedding safety and wellbeing into systems and day-to-day practices – tailored to learners' needs.



## **Here is a summary of the Code as it relates to international students.**

Tertiary providers should ensure international students:

- are protected and supported from when they leave their home country, to when they finish their education journey
- are aware of their rights and protections
- feel safe and happy while studying in New Zealand
- are provided correct information through agents, who act professionally
- are aware of the terms and conditions of their enrolment.



## Support services

Studying away from your home country is an exciting opportunity, and we want to make it as easy for you as possible. We have the following services available to make things easier while you focus on achieving your goals.

### **Manaaki Pūkenga – Academic Learning Advisors**

Our learning advisors are available to help develop your writing, critical thinking, and research and study skills. They can work alongside you and your tutors in the classroom, coordinate group-study sessions, connect you with other students studying the same things, or provide one-to-one support. ### **International student advisors**

Our International student advisors are your first

point of contact if you need a friendly face to help you navigate your journey. They work closely with all the student support service providers. This means they can point you in the right direction, whatever your question might be. Our team will support you as you settle into your new learning environment and the wider community. They can assist you in finding somewhere to live, help you understand New Zealand's culture and customs, and offer pastoral care and support. 
## **Wintec Apartments**


## **Rotokauri Eco Village**

# Design Factory NZ



Design Factory NZ offers a unique opportunity for students who are excited by possibility, motivated to drive change and open-minded thinkers.

## What is Design Factory NZ?

Design Factory NZ is part of the Design Factory Global Network, a group of innovation hubs in institutes across the globe. The purpose of Design Factory NZ is to drive effective problem-solving. It provides a unique learning experience with a focus on teaching innovation and Design Thinking.

## What is the value of this type of study?

The Design Factory NZ experience reflects the modern-day workplace, where employees from various teams, jobs and disciplines often work cross-functionally to solve organisational, social and business challenges. The skills and processes learned mean that no matter whether you are planning on being an engineer, graphic designer, social worker or sports scientist, you will be able to add value in your workplace as an innovative, solutions-focused leader.

## What do the courses involve?

You will learn to combine your diverse experiences to solve real-world problems. In the level 7 module, this problem is provided by an industry partner - a business or organisation that has a genuine challenge or problem to resolve. Working together with them, you will co-create a solution to their challenge. This industry engagement provides you with opportunities to build your communication skills and strong industry networks, while still studying at Wintec. The level 6 module focuses on design thinking tools and strategies.

## Where is it based?

Learners are in the dedicated, co-creation Design Factory NZ space at the Hamilton City Campus.

## Who can apply?

The Design Factory NZ 15 or 30-credit modules are currently available to second or third-year students working towards degrees in business, sport science, IT, engineering, social work, counselling, science and media arts (communications, design, performing arts, contemporary art). 
## Where can it lead?

The modules are a perfect pathway to further study to extend your innovation skills at postgraduate level. We offer both a Postgraduate Certificate in Innovation and a Master of Applied Innovation.



# Qualification levels

The New Zealand Qualifications Framework (NZQF) is comprised of ten levels and covers a range of qualifications from certificates to doctoral degrees. The levels are based on how complex the learning is; with one being the most basic, through to ten being the most complex.



## Entry requirements

There are set minimum requirements for academic entry to programmes for international students. To view academic entry requirements by country, visit [wintec.ac.nz/international/how-to-apply](http://wintec.ac.nz/international/how-to-apply) and scroll down to entry requirements.

### How can I gain entry to a course?

Every course has a set of entry criteria. These criteria are designed to ensure the level of complexity of the course fits your experience and knowledge base. How you gain entry may be based on what you completed at school, your on-the-job experience, or whether you have already studied at another institution.

If you cannot gain entry with the experience or qualifications you have to date, we also offer pathway courses (otherwise known as bridging or foundation studies). These help people gain entry into courses, who might not have the right experience or schooling to get started.

### Entry based on secondary school achievement or equivalent

Entry requires you to have completed study at a New Zealand secondary school, either through NCEA or the prior system (such as School Certificate) or equivalent.

### Entry based on tertiary study achievement

Entry is gained based on what you have already studied within a tertiary environment.

### On-the-job experience

Entry is gained based on your work experience. It acknowledges the relevant knowledge, skills, and experience that will help you be successful in the programme.

### English language requirements

These requirements are outlined on the web page of each course and are designed to ensure you have the right level of English competency to meet the needs of the course.



# Our programmes

**We offer a range of degrees, pathways and programmes, that have been created with academic and business experts for the purpose of making you an employable graduate. Additionally, our programmes are tailored to the specific needs of international students. Classes are taught in English but there are staff available who speak other languages if you need some extra support.**

# Foundation

Foundation courses are ideal for people who want to enhance their employment and study opportunities.

They are suitable if you do not meet the entry requirements for a specific programme or have been out of study for a long time. You will be graduate ready to progress straight into your next programme with the confidence to use the skills you have developed.

## New Zealand Certificate in Study and Career Preparation (Level 4)



Hamilton City Campus



Full-time: One semester



Start dates: February/July

If you wish to pursue tertiary study but need to build confidence or your study skills, this course is perfect for you. You will choose from one of five pathways that align with your study and career goals: Health, Social services, ECE, Creative Industries, or the Open pathway (for general subjects). You will gain essential academic knowledge, capabilities, and the skills needed to succeed at higher levels of study.

As a graduate you may be able to progress to further study in the following areas: nursing, midwifery, occupational therapy, enrolled nursing, physiotherapy, sport science, social work and counselling programmes, early childhood education, design, communication, visual art, music composition production and performance, and others.

### English language requirements

Candidates who have English as a second language are required to have an Academic International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 5.5 with no individual band score lower than 5.0 or equivalent.

## New Zealand Certificate in Health and Well-being (Social and Community Services) (Level 4)



Hamilton City Campus



Full-time: One year



Start dates: February/July

The one-year course provides you with the foundation knowledge, skills, and practical experience required to work alongside individuals, families, and whānau accessing social and community services. You can choose one of four strands as the focus of your study: Community Facilitation; Social Services; Mental Health and Addiction Support; or Community Health Work. You will also undertake a practicum (200 hours) relevant to your selected strand.

### English language requirements

Candidates who have English as a second language are required to have an academic International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 5.5, with no individual band score lower than 5.0; or equivalent.



## English language requirements

Candidates who have English as a second language are required to have an academic International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 5 (general or academic), with no individual band score lower than 5; or an equivalent.

# Business and Administration

## New Zealand Diploma in Business (Level 5) with strands in Accounting, Administration and Technology, Leadership and Management

 Hamilton City Campus

 Full-time: One year

 Start dates: February/July

This one-year business diploma, will give you broad business skills and knowledge. You will cover content such as Aotearoa New Zealand business context, business environment, function, change and innovation. You will also choose between one of the three strands of specialisation; accounting, administration and technology or leadership and management.

On completion of the course, you may work in a variety of business-related roles. Many graduates continue to study, progressing into the Bachelor of Applied Management or Bachelor of Accounting. You can credit many of the modules in this diploma towards the degrees.

### English language requirements

Candidates must provide evidence that they have the necessary English language proficiency and are required to have an International English Language Test System (IELTS) Academic band score of 5.5, with no individual band score lower than 5.0 from one test taken in the last two years, or equivalent.

## Bachelor of Applied Management (Level 7)

 Hamilton City Campus

 Full-time: Three years

 Start dates: February/July

The Bachelor of Applied Management is a three-year business degree, which you can complete either part or full-time. It has a practical focus and flexible structure; many of our students complete it while working.

You will have the choice of selecting from a diverse range of business-related specialisations. The majors on offer include: Human Resource Management; Operations and Production Management; Strategic Management; and Supply Chain Logistics.

As a graduate, and depending on your choice of major, you may become a human resource manager, management consultant, sales manager, marketing manager, business analyst, supply chain logistics manager or work in other management or business-related positions.

### English language requirements

Candidates who have English as a second language are required to have an International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 6.0, with no individual band score lower than 5.5; or equivalent.

## Bachelor of Accounting



Hamilton City Campus



Full-time: Three years



Level: 7



Start dates: February/July

The Bachelor of Accounting will equip you with the theory and practice of accountancy in an ethical, socially responsible and sustainable way to provide accounting and business advice to companies, organisations and individuals.

You will explore various accounting topics through active and applied learning, enabling you to develop comprehensive professional skills, knowledge and capabilities. An elective in your third year allows you to focus on another topic of interest in business.

This degree has CAANZ and CPA accreditation, allowing you to become a chartered accountant. Our graduates are known not only for being highly skilled but also for being able to hit the ground running.

Candidates are required to have an International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 6.0, with no individual band score lower than 5.5 from one test taken in the last two years, or equivalent.

## Graduate Diplomas (Level 7)



Hamilton City Campus



Full-time: One year



Start dates: February/July

Graduate diplomas provide a Level 7 business qualification (at the level of a business degree), with the equivalent of just one year's study commitment (studying either full or part-time). If you do not hold a tertiary degree but have been working in a related industry for some time, they can provide you with a degree-level qualification that acknowledges your experience. You can gain new skills and tools to extend your expertise, and in achieving a formal tertiary qualification, you may enable greater career progression in the future.

If you already hold a bachelor's degree but are looking for a pathway into a new area of expertise, a graduate diploma in a business-related field can assist. Completing a graduate diploma enables you to quickly transition into a new career pathway without requiring the commitment of another three to four years of degree-level study.

Graduate diplomas are also beneficial for those who have studied abroad and are looking to find an efficient solution to gain a New Zealand-recognised equivalent qualification.

### English language requirements

Candidates who have English as a second language are required to have an International English Language Test System (IELTS) score of 6.0, with no individual band score lower than 5.5; or equivalent.

### Graduate Diploma in Accounting

Modules cover financial accounting, management accounting, taxation in New Zealand, financial accounting, and management accounting.






## Bachelor of Communication (Level 7)

# Glossary

Would you like to understand the terms used within this Prospectus better? Here is an explanation of what many of the common words used within the education sector and at Wintec mean.

## **Alumni**

After you graduate, a tertiary institute considers you part of its alumni.

## **Campus**

The location where a programme is taught.

## **Co-requisite**

A module that, if not already passed, credited, or exempted, must be taken at the same time as the module for which it is specified.

## **Distance study and remote learning**

Students studying by distance study are not required to attend a Wintec campus on a regular basis.

## **Elective**

Some programmes might allow you to undertake elective modules from outside the main programme of study, or even from a different programme altogether.

## **Enrolment**

The formal process, including the payment of fees and other charges if necessary, by which a student is formally registered for a programme and can begin attending classes.

## **Micro-credential**

A short course designed for those who are already working within the industry who need to upskill in best-practice learnings.

## **Module**

A single paper that contributes to an entire qualification.

## **Moodle**

The Wintec student portal for course content, timetables, forum, discussions, assignments, and results.

## **Orientation**

A programme of activities to introduce new students to Wintec and assist in the transition to tertiary study.

## **Pathway**

The different ways you can enter a certain level of study, or a specific programme.

## **Placement**

A work-related experience at an external organisation where you will apply the skills and knowledge you learn in your programme to practical work.

## **Pre-requisite**

A module that must be passed or credited before you can enrol in the module for which the pre-requisite is specified.

## **Programme**

The qualification/course you are enrolled in, eg Bachelor of Design.

## **Qualification**

A certificate, diploma, or degree awarded following the successful completion of a programme of study.

## **Semester**

The Wintec teaching year is divided into two main semesters. Semester 1 is the equivalent of the first two secondary school terms, and Semester 2, the equivalent of the last two terms in the school year. Some programmes will also offer summer school, or Semester 3.

## **Transfer of credit**

Transfer of credit (TOC) is the process of assessing and awarding credit towards a programme based on past formal and informal learning.

## **Undergraduate**

Usually refers to first-time university programmes and bachelor's degrees.

# Important information

## Code of practice

When students come to study at Wintec, we have an important responsibility to ensure that those students are well informed, safe and properly cared for. Wintec is a signatory to The Education (Pastoral Care of Tertiary and International Learners) Code of Practice 2021, published by the New Zealand Ministry of Education. ## Accident insurance

Accident Compensation Corporation provides injury and accident insurance for all New Zealand citizens and temporary visitors to New Zealand, but you may still be liable for all other medical and related costs. Further information can be viewed on the ACC website at [acc.co.nz](http://acc.co.nz).

## Additional costs

It is important that you pay for the full costs of all services requested along with your tuition fees payment. A receipt will only be issued once full payment has been received by Wintec. At the time of printing your total living expenses required per year for Visa purposes is \$20,000 NZD. Some programmes have additional expenses such as books, stationery, uniforms, catering equipment and assignment materials. Prices vary so please enquire on application to a programme. Textbooks are usually between \$75 to \$110 each and some courses have additional independent activity fees.

## Attendance

You must attend 100% of your classes. If you miss a class, obtain a medical certificate or other evidence to explain your absence and give it to your tutor as soon as you return to class. Missing class will affect your visa renewal.

## Complaints process

NZQA assesses the standard of education for tertiary education organisations through a regular system of external evaluation and review (EER). Through periodic EER, tertiary education organisations are held accountable to their students, employers, funders, quality assurance bodies and other interested parties. ## Eligibility for health services

Most international students are not entitled to publicly funded health services while in New Zealand. If you receive medical treatment during your visit, you may be liable for the full costs of that treatment. Full details on entitlements to publicly funded health services are available through the Ministry of Health, and can be viewed on their website at [moh.govt.nz](http://moh.govt.nz).

## Medical and Travel Insurance

All international students (including groups of students) must have appropriate and current medical and travel insurance while living and/or studying in New Zealand. Assuming you have chosen to take the Wintec arranged StudentSafe insurance, your cover will commence 30 days before your programme start date. If you arrive in New Zealand earlier than this, you will need to organise your own insurance, or contact the Student Enrolment Centre to start your StudentSafe insurance earlier. ## IELTS

For information on IELTS please refer to the Academic Requirements. In all cases, IELTS assessments must be no less than two years old at the time of application, and you cannot combine test results.
