

Programme Regulations for:

Bachelor of Midwifery

*These regulations should be read in conjunction with the Institute's Academic Regulations **and** the current Midwifery Council of New Zealand for pre-registration midwifery education programme.*

1. Admission and Entry

1.1. General Academic Admission

- a) Candidates must have gained University Entrance, including:
 - i. a minimum of 18 credits at NCEA Level 3 in Biology and/or Chemistry; **or** a minimum of 16 credits at level 2 biology or chemistry if the applicant has not studied these subjects at level 3; **and**
 - ii. a minimum of 16 credits at NCEA Level 3 in an English language-rich subject (such as English, History, Art History, Classics, Geography, Economics or Media Studies); **and**
 - iii. a further 16 credits at NCEA Level 3 in an additional [approved subject](#)¹; **and**
 - iv. [Literacy](#)² (10 credits at NCEA Level 2 or above made up of 5 credits each in reading and writing); **and**
 - v. [Numeracy](#)³ (10 credits at NCEA Level 1 or above), **or**
 - vi. Equivalent.
- b) Candidates aged under 20 years must meet the general academic admission criteria as detailed above. Provisional entry will not be considered for this programme.
- c) Candidates who have studied on a Midwifery Degree programme at another institution will need to meet the Bachelor of Midwifery programme entry requirements or equivalent. They will also need evidence of a B grade average (i.e. above a B minus average) and a letter of recommendation and a confidential report on the student from the Head of Midwifery of the previous programme, before they will be considered for admission to the Bachelor of Midwifery programme.
- d) Candidates who have completed an approved foundation, bridging or tertiary introductory programme in Health at Level 4, with 65% or higher in all modules will be considered for admission to the Bachelor of Midwifery programme.

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1.2. Special Admission

- a) Domestic candidates aged 20 years or above who have not met the General Admission or entry requirements for a programme but whose skills, education or work experience indicate that they have a reasonable chance of success⁴ may be eligible for Special Admission. Special Admission will be granted at the discretion of the Head of Midwifery/Centre Director or designated nominee. Such candidates may be required to successfully complete a foundation, bridging or tertiary introductory programme as a condition of entry into higher level programmes.

Candidates will be required to produce:

- i. Evidence of academic equivalence of the above qualifications, or
- ii. Evidence of ability to study successfully at degree level.

1.3. Selection Criteria

- a) Candidates will be required to complete:

- i. Self-declaration of criminal convictions, and
- ii. Self-declaration of mental and physical condition, and
- iii. One written reference.

They may also be required to provide additional information and/or attend an interview/hui in order for their application to be assessed.

- b) Candidates are required in their application to indicate whether they have been convicted of, or have been prosecuted for, a criminal offence. Candidates should be aware that, under the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act 2003 (HPCA Act (2003)), some types of criminal conviction may result in the Midwifery Council of New Zealand refusing to allow a person to register as a Midwife. Similarly, some types of criminal conviction may result in difficulty to obtain a clinical practice placement and therefore meet the requirements to pass the programme.

- c) Candidates are required in their application to indicate whether they have had a mental and/or physical condition that may prevent them entering the Bachelor of Midwifery programme. Candidates are required under the HPCA Act (2003) to demonstrate that they are fit for registration as they progress through the programme. Candidates should be aware that, under the HPCA Act (2003), some types of convictions, physical or mental conditions, or professional or academic misconduct, may result in the Midwifery Council of New Zealand being unable to register a person as a Midwife.

1.4. Safety Check Requirements

In order to comply with the provisions of the Vulnerable Children's Act, 2014 and Child Protection Policies for all '*specified organisations*' providing a '*regulated service*', all candidates/students will be subjected to safety checks. These will include, but are not limited to;

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- (1) Referee Checks,
- (2) A Police Vet Check,
- (3) A Risk Assessment.

Applicants may also be required to attend an interview.

Any unsatisfactory result arising from the full safety checking process may result in the candidate/student being precluded/declined entry or withdrawn from the programme of study. Furthermore, students must declare any pending or new convictions arising during any stage throughout the entire enrolment period. A conviction or failure to declare a conviction may also result in the student being immediately withdrawn from the programme. Persons who are convicted of '*specified offences*' will not be accepted onto any programme that requires that person to work in an organisation providing a regulated service.

1.5. Clinical Practice Requirements

- a) Before undertaking clinical practice within the programme, candidates will be required to provide a written health and immunity status assessment from their health practitioner.
- b) Candidates must hold a current First Aid Certificate prior to undertaking any clinical practice module in the programme.

1.6. English Language Requirements

- a) Candidates who have English as an additional language are required to achieve in the International English Language Test System (IELTS) (academic version) with an overall score of 7.0 with not less than 6.5 in writing and comprehension; and not less than 7.0 in speaking and listening. A pass in the Occupational English Test (OET) is either A or B in each section. These scores must be achieved in one sitting of the IELTS or OET test.

2. Transfer of Credit

- 2.1. A candidate with previous midwifery or similar qualifications will be able to apply for Transfer of Credit (TOC) to determine their programme of study. Formal and Informal Transfer of Credit is available for this programme and will be considered on a case by case basis. The proposed programme of study must be submitted to the MCNZ for approval within one month of approval.
- 2.2. Registered health practitioners from other disciplines who seek Formal and/or Informal Transfer of Credit (Recognition of Prior Learning) on the basis of their health professional qualification and practice experience must hold registration with the relevant regulatory authority in New Zealand and provide a Certificate of Good Standing from that authority.
- 2.3. The maximum transfer of credit which may be granted without prior approval from the Midwifery Council of New Zealand towards this programme is 75 credits.

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- 2.4. No more than 200 practice hours may be credited without prior approval from the Midwifery Council of New Zealand.

3. Programme Requirements

- 3.1. Every candidate for the Bachelor of Midwifery shall to the satisfaction of the Academic Board follow a programme of study for a period of normally not less than three years.
- 3.2. Each candidate's programme of study shall comprise compulsory modules totalling 480 credits as specified in Section 6 of these regulations.
- 3.3. In each of years one and two, students may re-enrol once in no more than two papers.
- 3.4. Students can only re-enrol once in a third year module, and then only in extenuating circumstances.

4. Completion of the Programme

- 4.1 Time-limits for completion of the Bachelor of Midwifery programme are as follows:
 - a) A candidate will normally complete the Bachelor of Midwifery within a minimum of three years and no more than four years, unless an extension is granted by special permission by the Head of Midwifery or designated nominee (following successful application to Midwifery Council New Zealand).
 - b) Candidates who take more than 6 months leave from the programme must undertake a formal practical assessment and a theory assessment before re-joining the programme. The cost of the assessment will be met by the candidate. This assessment must provide evidence that the candidate has retained the appropriate level of knowledge and skill to re-enter the programme at the same stage.

5. Award of the Qualification

- 5.1 Candidates who successfully complete the requirements as specified in section 3 of these regulations will be awarded the Bachelor of Midwifery.
- 5.2 Candidates for the Bachelor of Midwifery should note that successful completion of the degree alone is not sufficient for registration. Candidates who have completed the degree successfully, will be required to, on the first available occasion, sit the Midwifery Council of New Zealand's National Examination for entry to the Register of Midwives.
