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
Centre for Health and Social Practice

Pharmacology for Nursing Practice Online One semester Level: 8 Credits: 30 Semester 1: 13 February Semester 2: 10 July

This module enables registered nurses to integrate and apply principles of clinical pharmacology to specific healthcare contexts. You will develop an in-depth understanding of pharmacotherapeutic principles, including pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics, regulatory/legislative frameworks, interdisciplin-ary relationships, and evidence bases that facilitate clinical preparation for prescribing in advanced nursing roles.

Advanced Nursing Practice in Breast Care Online and Hamilton City Campus One semester Level: 8 Credits: 30 Semester 2: 14 July online start, online workshops 11-12 September

This module is designed to enable registered nurses to advance their knowledge and skills for nursing practice to meet the healthcare needs of clients using breast care services. Participants will explore nursing roles and relationships within interprofessional breast care services and develop strategies to advance nursing knowledge and therapeutic skills for a holistic approach to women's health.


Advanced Practice in Longterm Conditions Online One semester Level: 8

In addition, you will develop a deeper understanding of the relationships between people, systems, and the socio-political and cultural contexts that may influence the improvement and maintenance of health, wellbeing, and quality of life.
