We offer various resources and programmes to help you make the big decisions.

Waikato Trades Academy (WTA)

The Waikato Trades Academy (WTA) is funded by the government to provide secondary students with the opportunity to study at both school and Wintec.

As a WTA student, you can enrol in one of the programmes that WTA provides. This is in addition to your current school subject choices. You will travel to the Wintec campuses for practical, handson learning, typically one day a week.

Secondary Tertiary Alignment Resource (STAR)

A STAR taster course is perfect if you are a secondary student considering your post-school options.

STAR courses are available for Year 10 to Year 13 students. These courses aim to showcase a specific career or qualification and are typically one day long (but may be up to five in some instances). You may be able to earn Unit Standards when completing a STAR course. There is a range of courses available.

You will be based at one of our two campuses in Hamilton or one of our delivery sites around the Waikato.

Hamilton City Campus

The historic City Campus offers easy access to food outlets, retail shops, the Waikato River, Lake Rotoroa, and public transport. Highlights of the Campus include the Gallagher Hub, Atrium, and Te Kōpū Mānia o Kirikiriroa (the Wintec Marae). Nursing, health, education, business, IT and media arts are some of the programmes taught here.

Hamilton Rotokauri Campus

Our Rotokauri Campus, located in the northwestern part of Hamilton, has purpose-built facilities and plenty of green space. The Campus includes a library, basketball court and a café. Programmes taught here include sport science, trades, engineering, animal technology, horticulture, and hospitality, plus many more.

At Wintec, we believe the cost of studying shouldn't stand in the way of achieving your goals. That's why we offer a range of opportunities to study without paying fees, helping to make education more accessible and relieving financial pressure for many learners.

Funding Options

- Government Fees Free: If you are a first-time tertiary learner, you may be able to utilise the Fees Free scheme. From 1 January 2025, Fees Free covers the final year of study.
- Wintec Fee-Free Programmes: Access subsidised programmes in high-demand industries to support employment and career growth.
- Māori and Pasifika Trades Training (MPTT): Māori and Pacific learners aged 16–40 may qualify to study for free across selected programmes.
- Youth Guarantee: Provides opportunities for young people aged 16-24 ready to enter tertiary study.

These initiatives are designed to open pathways to learning, career development, and personal growth.

Qualification levels

The New Zealand Qualifications Framework (NZQF) is comprised of ten levels and covers a range of qualifications from certificates to doctoral degrees. The levels are based on how complex the learning is; with level 1 being the most basic, through to level 10 being the most complex.

Certificate Level 1–6 Certificates are awarded in a variety of subjects at a range of levels and may be of differing lengths.	Diploma Level 5–7 Diplomas awarded are usually at a higher level than certificates and are 1–2 years in length.	Bachelor's Level 7 A bachelor's is awarded for advanced study that concentrates on general principles and essential knowledge. They are usually 3-4 years in length.	Graduate, Postgraduate Level 7–8 These programmes are for study after the completion of an initial degree and are ideal if you want to broaden your existing knowledge or retrain in areas of demand.	A master's is awarded for study beyond an initial degree and will generally involve a combination of intensive study and supervised research. The next step is a doctoral degree Level 10.



Entry requirements

Every programme at Wintec has specific entry requirements designed to ensure the programme aligns with your experience and knowledge. There are multiple ways to gain entry, whether through your previous education, work experience, or other pathways.

Pathways to Entry

- Secondary School Achievement Entry may be based on your studies at a New Zealand secondary school, including NCEA or previous systems such as School Certificate.
- Tertiary Study Achievement You can gain entry based on prior tertiary education, recognising your academic achievements in another learning environment.
- On-the-Job Experience
 Relevant work experience can also qualify you for
 entry. This acknowledges the skills and expertise
 you've gained through your career, ensuring your
 readiness to succeed.

• Foundation Programmes

If you don't meet the standard entry requirements, our Foundation Programmes are here to help. These programmes are designed to build the knowledge, skills, and confidence you need to progress into your chosen area of study.

• Discretionary Entrance

If you don't meet the formal criteria but believe you have the capability to succeed, you can apply for discretionary entrance. Applications are reviewed by the relevant centre manager and may be approved if you can demonstrate a strong chance of success. Please note that further study beyond the initial programme may require additional evidence of readiness.

English Language Requirements

English competency requirements are outlined on the webpage for each programme. These ensure you have the skills necessary to meet the demands of the programme.

Visit wintec.ac.nz/apply to apply for your chosen programme. The process takes around 15 minutes, and you can save and return to it anytime.

Initial application

Create your account, select the course you want to apply for, and complete the application form.

Processing of your application

You may hear back from us immediately with an offer of a place. Your offer may be "unconditional", which means your offer is confirmed, and nothing additional is required. Alternatively, it may say "conditional", which means you have an offer; however, we still require more information from you before it can be confirmed (this might be exam results, supporting documents, or other information). Depending on your programme, you may also be asked to meet with a member of our academic staff. Our team will keep you up-to-date through the application journey so you know exactly what you need to provide us with and when.

Enrolment

Once you have received an offer, either online or via email, you can accept your place. We will enrol you in the programme and contact you regarding payment of your fees. Prepare for a career in the armed forces, the Police, or Corrections with this focused programme.

Gain the skills, knowledge, and confidence to apply for training and boost career opportunities in these sectors. Through problem-solving and scenariobased learning, you'll build confidence, leadership capabilities, interview skills and physical fitness to meet entry requirements into the services.

This one-year programme equips you with the knowledge, skills, and practical experience to support individuals, families, and whānau in social and community services.

Choose from two strands and complete 200 practicum hours in your chosen area.

- Mental Health and Addiction Support
- Whānau, Community, and Social Services

Flexible delivery options include on-campus, online, or blended learning.

Graduates can pursue roles in mental health, community development, and residential care, or progress to higher-level study.

This programme helps you build the confidence and capability to make a meaningful difference.

Entry Criteria

You can apply for this programme if you meet one or more of the below options:

- 1. Based on your school achievement (secondary study):
 - 40 credits at NCEA Level 1; including 10 literacy credits and 10 numeracy credits; OR
 - A recognised equivalent.
- 2. Based on study completed after school (tertiary study):
 - A relevant course at NZQF Level 3; OR
 - A recognised equivalent.
- 3. Based on your work experience (on the job).

If you can demonstrate relevant knowledge, skills and experience that you have gained through work experience, that will help you to be successful in the programme.

This programme is ideal if you're starting tertiary study and want to build confidence and academic skills. Choose from four pathways aligned to your career goals: Health, Social Practice, Creative Industries, or Early Childhood Education.

You'll develop essential knowledge and capabilities to succeed in higher-level study, with support from experienced tutors. For Māori and Pacific learners in the Health pathway, classes are whānau-based and there is an additional option to join our Pacific Wayfinder or Mana Whenua streams.

- 1. Based on your school achievement (secondary study):
 - 40 credits at NCEA Level 2; including 10 literacy credits at NCEA Level 2 and 10 numeracy credits at NCEA Level 1; OR
 - A recognised equivalent.
- 2. Based on study completed after school (tertiary study):
 - A relevant course at NZQF Level 3 or above; OR
 - A recognised equivalent.

This programme is ideal for owners and managers in agricultural businesses, or those with industry experience ready to step into a management role.

Designed to fit around work commitments, this programme is composed of eight block courses delivered online. Gain confidence in presenting accounts, making sound business decisions, and applying your learning directly to your agribusiness.

This programme equips you with an industryrecognised qualification to achieve your career and business goals.

Entry Criteria

Candidates are required to have gained:

- 48 credits at NCEA Level 2 including 12 credits in English or Māori; OR
- A relevant qualification at NZQF Level 3 or above; OR
- A recognised equivalent.

 - Be employed within an organisation that enables nurse prescribing through policy, audit, peer review and accessibility of continuing education, while undertaking the prescribing practicum.
